2018 is the 100th anniversary of the recovery of Poland's independence.

For 123 years Poland was divided between Austria, Prussia and Russia. It did not exist as a country until after World War I in 1918.

<u>On Jan, 8, 1918</u> President Wilson delivered his Fourteen Points to a Joint Session of Congress. He listed the principles for peace to end the war and to guarantee the political and territorial independence of countries. *What he said about Poland:*

XIII. "An independent Polish state should be erected which should include the territories inhabited by indisputably Polish populations, which should be assured a free and secure access to the sea, and whose political and economic independence and territorial integrity should be guaranteed by international covenant."

These were decorated with home-made ornaments, fashioned from straw, paper or Christmas wafers as well as sweets, gingerbread hearts and "marcypan" (almond-paste) figures. But a whole Christmas tree was never suspended from the ceiling."

National History Day

Each year middle and high school students across Wisconsin participate in National history Day (NHD). They present their researched topics in one of these categories: Documentary, Exhibit, Paper, Performance or Website. The top entries in each category (and in the JUNIOR GROUP, SENIOR GROUP, SENIOR INDIVIDUAL) advance to the National Contest in Maryland. In 2017 out of 400 projects that competed in Wisconsin's History Day, 36 advanced to the Nationals.

"The theme is chosen for the broad application to world, national, or state history and its relevance to ancient history or to the more recent past....The intentional selection of the theme for NHD is to provide an opportunity for students to push past the antiquated view of history as mere facts and dates and drill down into historical content to develop perspective and understanding."

2017 theme: Taking a Stand in History

"Taking a stand really means to take a side for or against something. There are many ways people have taken a stand in history. When people take a stand, they have to defend ideas or actions they believe in. They might use force, like the American patriots did against the British. Or they might use peaceful actions, like Martin Luther King did when marching for civil rights. When someone takes a stand, they are trying to make a change in the way things are.

These changes can have short term, long term, or both kinds of changes. Taking a stand is more than just being against something. It's a way of making your voice heard to make change happen. Groups of people often stand together for or against things they want to change. Working men and women joined unions to take a stand for better wages and time off. Countries around the world formed the League of Nations after World War I to take a stand against future wars. Is it always successful? Not always. The League of Nations fell apart as World War II began. Unions have far fewer members today than they used to. Sometimes change takes a very long time. It took over 100 years for women to succeed in their stand to gain the right to vote. Throughout history men, women, and even children have taken a stand for what they believe in, either through force, through their actions, or through speaking out."

2018 theme: Conflict & Compromise in History

"Conflict: can be more than a physical battle, also considered a disagreement about an idea or difference in opinions. **Compromise:** A compromise is an agreement in which each side makes concessions or accepted a deal less than what was ideal. In History: NHD encourages students to look at a topic that impacts today, but don't pick a recent event. Topics must be at least 20 years old to be considered historical. If you like a more recent topic, find a way to connect it to an older event. It will also help you to explain the impact of your chosen subject on the world today."

National History Day in Wisconsin

February or March contests are held in Wisconsin's eight regions. Fees are \$5-\$10 per student. Winners advance to the State Event in Madison at the Historical Society for National History Day (NHD) in Wisconsin - April 21, 2018. Two winners in each category go to Maryland, this year on June 10-14.
